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History of the Snider Family.

This is a historical sketch of our branch of the Snider family in Canada, and how we being from German ancestry, came to be identified with the United Empire Loyalists.

Back in the seventeenth century, when Protestant England overthrew the Stuarts, William Prince of Orange was invited to the British throne as William III. This created a very strong friendship between the German-speaking provinces and England.

Again, in 1714 Queen Anne died without an heir, but the royal line was continued through another branch of the family, that of Sophia of Hanover. She had a son George Louis, and in order to keep the British throne Protestant, he was invited to rule as George I. This further cemented the friendship, so that when in the reign of George III during the American revolution, 1774-1778, Britain being short of trained soldiers, the Duke of Hesses sent the Hessian Guards as a separate unit with its own officers to America to operate under a British Commander. These Hessian soldiers took the oath of allegiance and fought with the British all through the war.

After the war the Hessians were disbanded. About half of them returned home, and the remainder settled in Pennsylvania and New York States. Many of these disbanded Hessian Guards showed their loyalty to Britain by following the British Loyalists to Canada where they had gone at the conclusion of the war, settling in Upper Canada near Fort Frontenac (Kingston) at Adolphustown, near Bath, Addington County, north of the Bay of Quinte.

These Hessians, having taken the oath of allegiance, received off Britain their script for land and settled in the south and eastern portion of Prince Edward County, in what is now known as Cressy. They had to wait until the government made a new survey on the south side of the Bay of Quinte. They arrived about ten years after the first British Loyalists.

Among these Hessian Loyalists were the Sniders, Dingmans, Minakers, Bougards, Huyckes, Prayners, and others. Representing our family was Doctor Schneider who had been a military surgeon in the Hessian Guards. He was born at Hesse Cassel about 1750 and when he sailed from Hamburg he left only his sister weeping on the wharf. He never saw her again. He had a brother who came to America, and after the war, to Canada, but all trace of him was lost as the whole country was bush, and communication was difficult. There are a number of Sniders in York County, near Toronto, who have a family resemblance, and may be offsprings of this brothers.

Dr. Schneider brought his wife to Canada and settled ~~among~~ among the other Loyalists. He died early in the last century, and his wife who had been born at Hanover lived to be over a hundred years of age. She lived with her son Tobias Snider on the old homestead. I can remember the little old lady sitting in her big arm chair, although I was only five or six years old. I have heard father say that she used to receive letters written in German addressed "Schneider".

All the German names in time became Anglicised, because the English Loyalists could not, or would not, try to spell the German, so our name became "Snider".

Dr. Snider had three sons, Ernest Henry, Tobias and John and two or more daughters. One daughter I know married Richard Huff. Father used to call Col. Henry Dingman "Uncle Henry" so he must have married another daughter.

A most important thing took place which shaped the destiny of all the United Empire Loyalists in Upper Canada. In about 1765 a number of Irish Methodists had ^{been} sent out to America by John Wesley. After the war some of these Methodists, under the leadership of Phillip ^{W.}mbury and his sister Barbara Heck, came to Canada and a

great revival took place. Nearly all the pioneers came under the influence of this wonderful "Penetcost", and that is why all these Loyalist Families and their descendants were such strong Methodists. Wherever you find any of their offshoots you find loyal, faithful Christians. That old time religion seems to have reached to their children, and their children's children, like an old promise being fulfilled.

Dr. Snider's son Ernest Henry, my grandfather, was a Methodist preacher with more than ordinary ability. One writer of note has said of him, "That grand old patriarch of Christ likeness whose religious zeal and Godlike life did so much for the establishment of Christianity in primitive life of Upper Canada."

This information has been obtained through several years of enquiring, correspondence early recollection, and history.

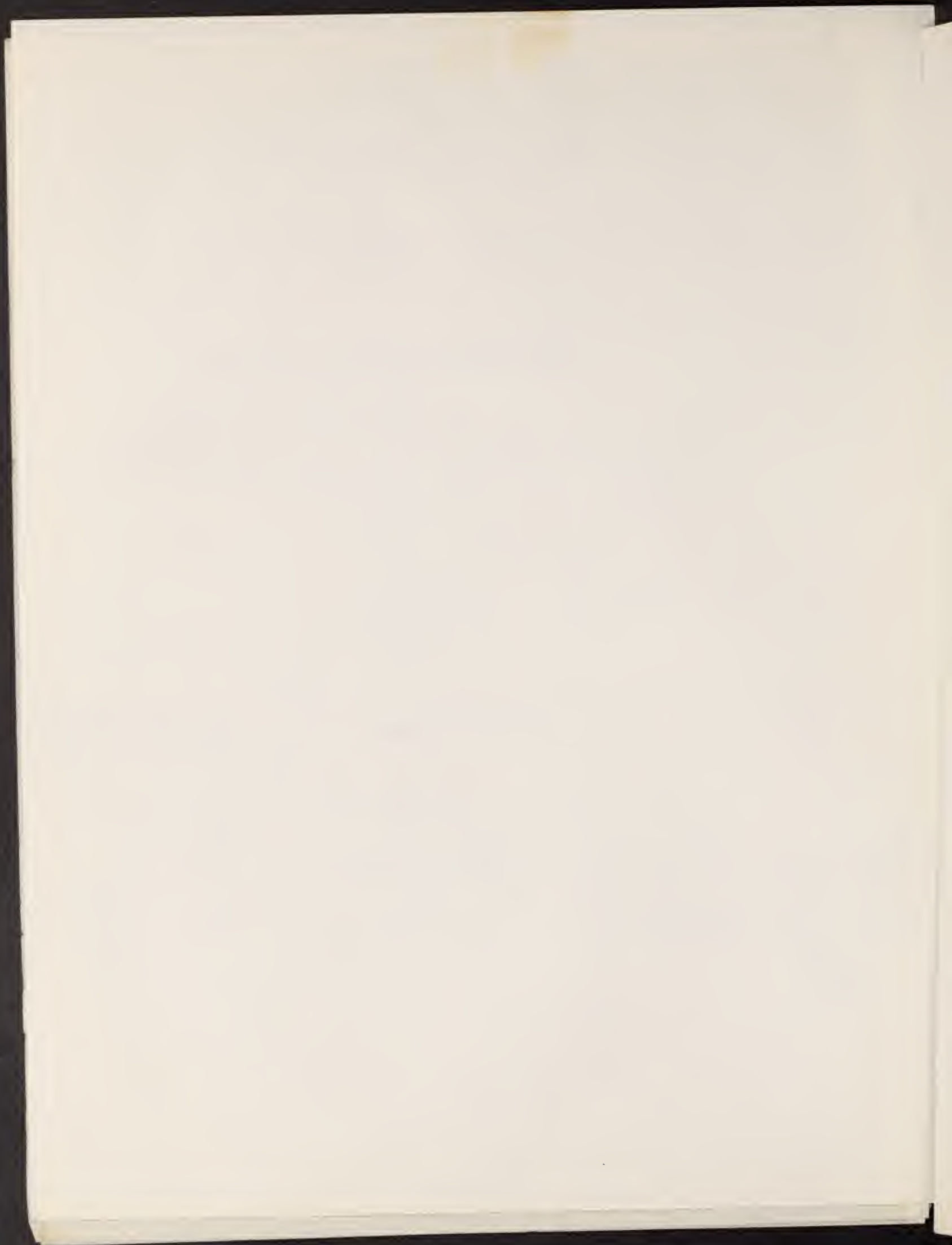

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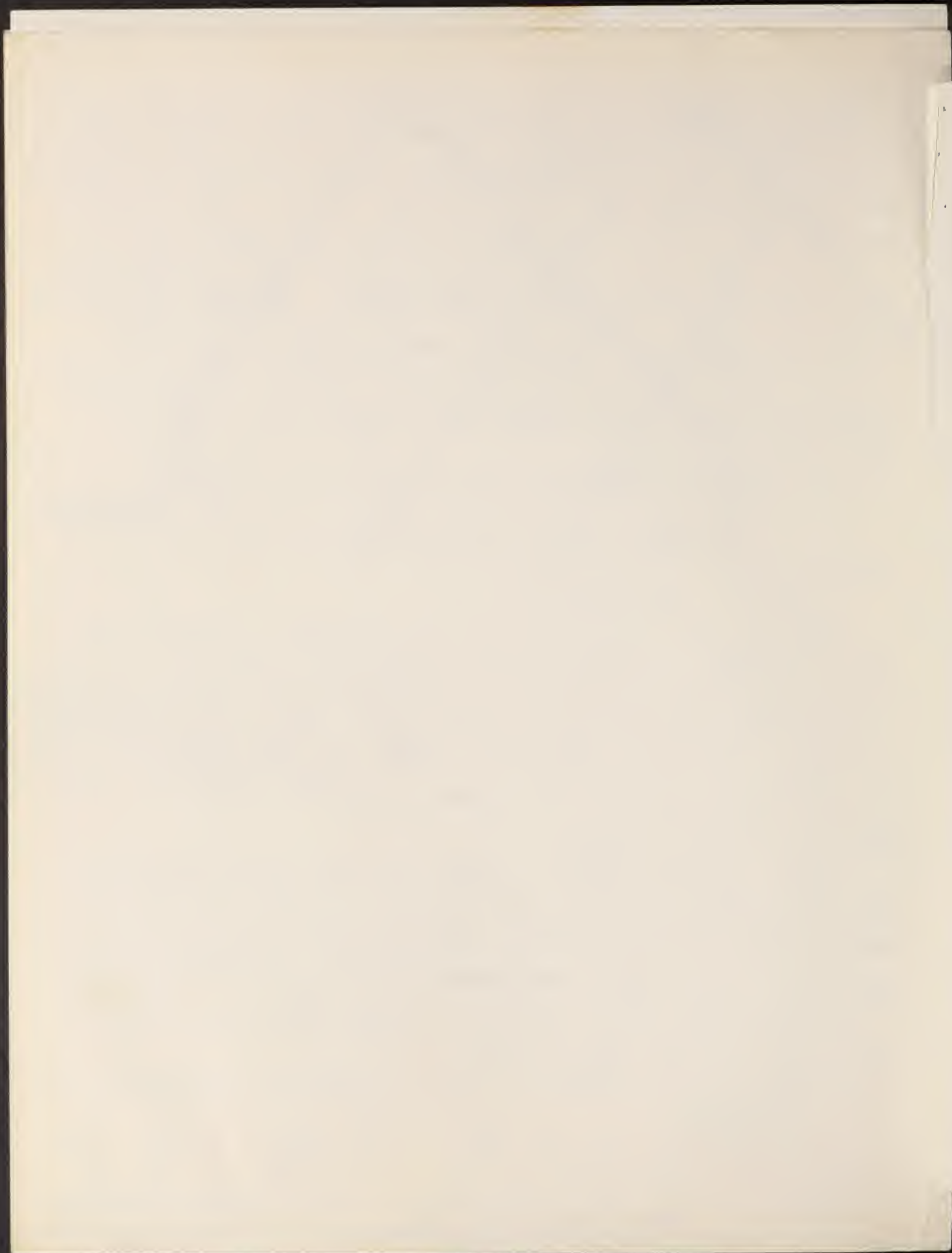
Among the many families who took part in the emigration from ~~Prattville~~ the Rhine Valley to England and ultimately to America in the early years of the 18th century was one John Schneider, his wife and a six year old son named John Joost. ~~This~~ The father, known as John Wilhelm Schneider from Nieder-Eldems, Commune of Heckerberg, had married Anna Catharina, daughter of Stephan Thoreus of Wolfenberger, of the same commune. They had two sons: John Wilhelm, who married Ann Gertrud, and John Joost who married Anna Magdalena Elisabeth, the daughter of Zacharias.

Among the many families of Pralatin origin, or from the Rhine Valley who emigrated to England and ultimately to America in the early years of the eighteenth century was John Schneider, with his wife, Elisabeth Meyer and their six year old son Johannes Joost. All had come from the Rhine Valley.

John Joost's future wife, Anna Magdalena Elisabeth, daughter of Zacharias Flayler and his wife Anna Gertrud Huen who were married Aug. 10, 1710. Their daughter was born Sept 12, 1712 at the ~~Prattville~~ Valley, West Camp N.Y.

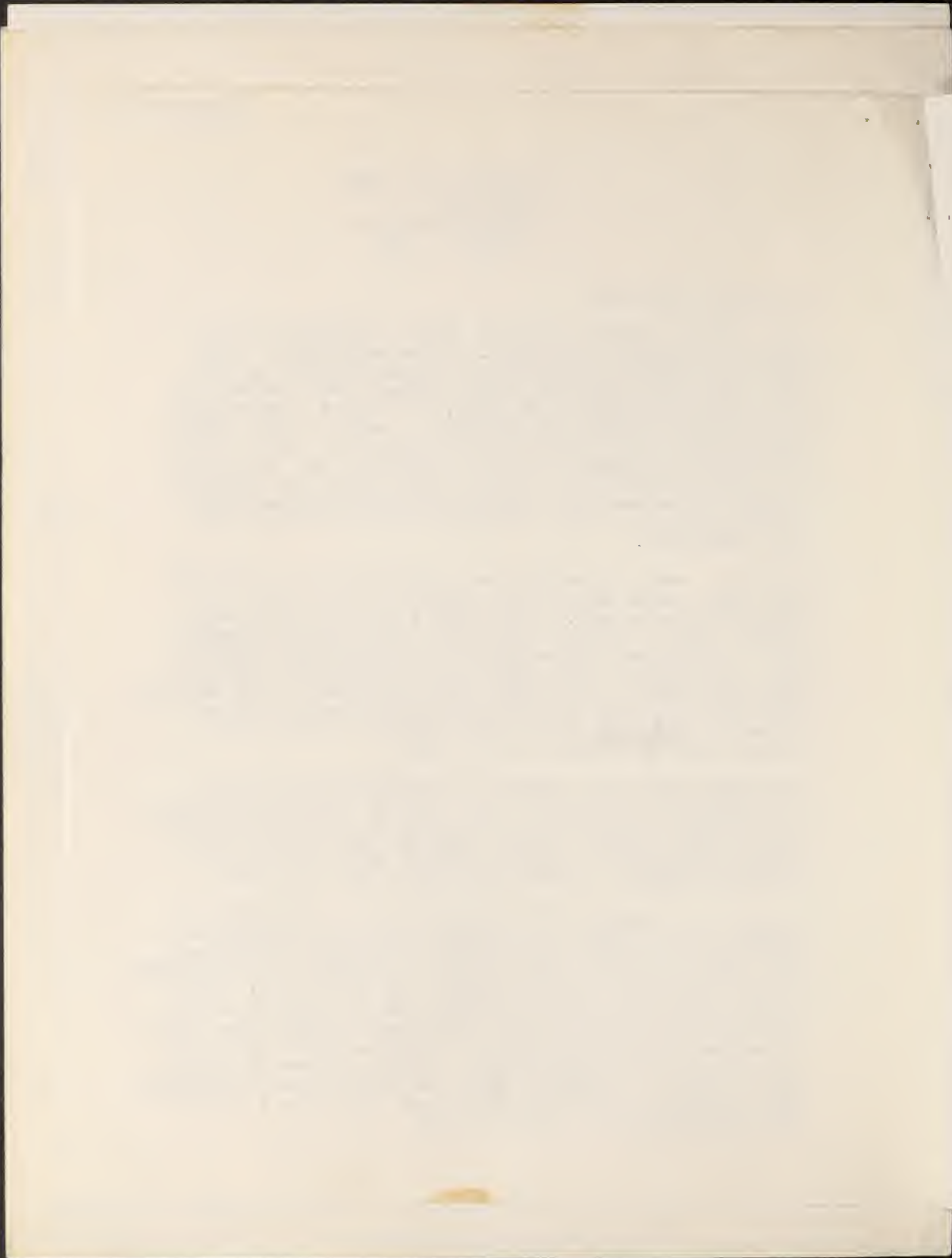
My Dear Dr. Burleigh:

First of all, please accept my sincere apologies for not being more prompt in my reply. While waiting to receive papers from my distant relative in Saskatchewan to confirm what I had told you about Johannes Joost Snider and Anna Magdalena Elizabeth Flagler, I received a summons to make myself available for Jury duty. Soon, I found myself involved on a Public Institutions Inspection panel, which was very time consuming, but at the same time, very rewarding. Now, finally, my relative has sent me the document I want to give you, and I have been looking forward to writing you before I get involved in the campaign of our local candidate.

Secondly, your two letters were received here, and I just don't know how to express my thanks to you for the information they contained. Every time I hear from you is a special event. I'm glad you found some data on Johannes' wife. The Mormon archive Record I have enclosed confirms your information. I do thank you so kindly for copying these many items of interests from the books in your library. You asked me to see if I could sort out some of the data you sent on Flagler, and I have tried to do just that. Please check it and see if you agree.

The Mormon sheet is a wealth of information, and I am hoping that my sending this will in some way make up for my tardiness in replying. I am going to pursue this Mormon thing a bit further. I will write and see if they have a record on "Hannes of Johannes SNYDER" and "LIESBAETH or Elizabeth MEYER". We have nothing to lose, I'm sure.

I used to correspond with a lady who was a descendent of Abraham, son of Simon, and another one whose husband was a descendent of Isaac, son of Simon. I was so overwhelmed when you told me you might publish a pamphlet on the SNIDERS, I have been making lists of what I can do to help. I have pulled a few things from my files, and will get in touch with these two ladies and see if we can use what they have. I have much more information, of course, mostly about the last three or four generations. If you can use it, just say the word. My husband suggested that we come to Kingston some Sunday and show you what I have. What can I do for you, Dr. Burleigh? I want to help.



I also have a copy of Zechariah's (son of Simon) discharge papers, and his application to have his name placed on the United Empire Loyalist List so that his children may receive Crown Lands. I am sure that there is much more I could do, but I really don't know where to start. I had been making some inquiries from laymen about publishing the data I have, but somehow, it didn't seem complete without knowing the origin of the Sniders in Germany. A lot of my relatives have asked me when I plan to publish, so maybe this item would sell. I presume that I have understood you properly, that you would publish this pamphlet to sell. Will you please let me know what is involved.

I have copies of other documents such as Mary Miller Snider's (daughter of Jacob Miller) petition for crown lands, and deeds to Jacob Snider's (son of Zechariah) property in Camden township.

I could kick myself for not going on those trips with the Bay of Quinte Chapter, to the Mohawk valley, etc. Next time, for sure.

Dr. Burleigh, will you please have a look in your Spring, 1975 copy of the Loyalist Gazette. On page 14, H. Elgin Snider of Box #659, Gravenhurst has requested Snider information. I visited him one time and concluded that his family was not connected with mine. However, it is possible that it may be. What do you think. Perhaps we should steer clear of this guy? I never ever sent him a copy of my tree. I note that he mentions a Baltus Snider. Johannes had a son Baltus. He also mentions Flagler in his Kings County New Brunswick Sniders. I note that there is a Flagler from Florida who is a member of Bay of Quinte Chapter. Do you know him?

The only thing I plan to do at present, is write to the Mormon Library. I will not contact the other ladies who are descendents of Simon until I hear from you.

I am looking forward with great interest to your next letter.

Thank you again, for all your kindness to me.

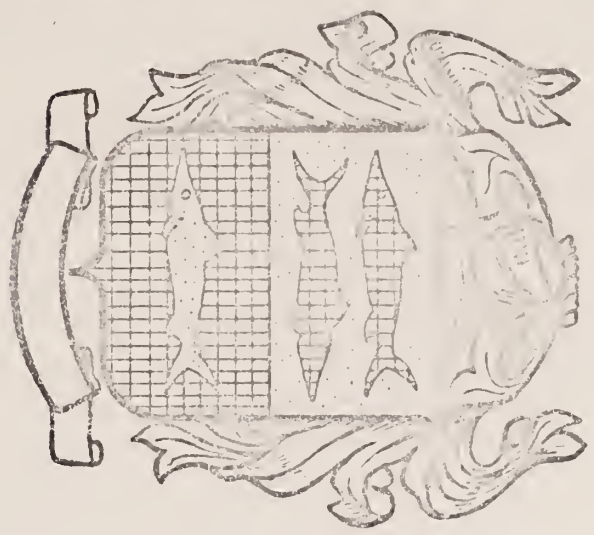

Coat of Arms



Snider

Historical The Snider Coat of Arms illustrated left was drawn by an heraldic artist from information officially recorded in ancient heraldic archives. Documentation for the Snider Coat of Arms design can be found in Rietstap Armorial General. Heraldic artists of old developed their own unique language to describe an individual Coat of Arms. In their language, the Arms (shield) is as follows:

"Coupe d'or sur sa., a trois espadons (poissons) nageants, de l'un a l'autre, deux sur l'or, l'un sur l'autre, dont le deuxieme cont., et un sur le sa."

When translated the blazon also describes the original colors of the Snider Arms as it appeared centuries ago. Family mottoes are believed to have originated as battle cries in medieval times. A Motto was not recorded with this Snider Coat of Arms. Individual surnames originated for the purpose of more specific identification. The four primary sources for second names were: occupation, location, father's name, or personal characteristics. The surname Snider appears to be occupational in origin, and is believed to be associated with the Dutch and German's, meaning, "one who made outer garments; a tailor." The supplementary sheet included with this report is designed to give you more information to further your understanding of the origin of names. Different spellings of the same original surname are a common occurrence. Dictionaries of surnames indicate probable spelling variations of Snider to be Snyder, Sneider, Snieder, Schneider, Schnieder, and Schneideman. Although bearers of the old and distinguished Snider name comprise a small fraction of the population there are a number who have established for it a significant place in history. They include: JACOB SNIDER (d. 1866) American inventor of the "Brech-loading Rifle", better known as "Snider Rifle", which was adopted after 1859 by the British Government. FRANS SNIDER (Snyders) (1579-1657) Dutch painter who specialized in the painting of animals. Was both a friend and a co-worker of Rubens. DEJOU JACQUES SNIDER (1841-1925) Author who was born in Cherry Valley, New York. His most famous writings include, "The Chemistry of Plant and Animal Life", which he wrote in 1903, and "Dairy Chemistry." JEFFERSON SNIDER (Snyder) (1848-1926) Lawyer who was born in Berks County, Pennsylvania and who received his A.B. from Lafayette College in Easton, Pennsylvania in 1872. He was admitted to the bar in 1875, and practiced primarily in Reading. CONRAD VICTOR SNIDER (Schneider) (1870-1880) German physician and author. His most valuable written work is believed to be "De Cataractis", in which he gives an anatomical description of the interior structure of the nose, the lining of the cavities of the nose, and various intricate sections, the lining having been named in his honor, "The Schneiderian Membrane." JOHANN GOTTLIEB SNIDER (Schneider) (1750-1822) German philologist and naturalist who was Professor of Ancient Languages and Eloquence in Frankfurt-on-the-Oder for many years. He brought editions of several classical works, and wrote numerous treatises on natural history, among them, "Ichthyology of the Ancients", "Physiology of Amphibious Animals", and his "Greck-german Lexicon", written in 1797, is esteemed to be his highest standard work. Your letter of June 26, 1972 has been received. I was surprised to hear from you again, and I thank you very much for answering all my questions.

I have read your letter over & over again, & it seems hard to believe that after struggling for information for about four years, I have finally met someone like you who knows so much about the Sniders & the Bay of Quinte pioneers. The encouragement I have received from your two letters has made me determined to help others whenever possible.

Thank you for your invitation to review your huge file on the Snider family. I am looking forward to seeing it as soon as I can possibly manage it. It is very tempting.

I regret that my father & I did not stop in
 while in the area. He has been a tremendous
 help to me getting started on the Snider genealogy.
 He has always been interested in family history;
 even as a boy, he cornered a great uncle who
 told him about the family's being Loyalists, &
 all of it has proven out.

My father is in his seventies and was always
 a very active man, being in the construction
 business for over 40 years. A few years ago
 a stroke forced him to retire, & although he is
 surprisingly well, the slowed down activity was
 very hard for him to accept. When I became interes-
 ted in the family tree, it seemed to give him a
 new purpose, & drew us closer together. Our trip
 in May was one of those ~~rare~~ ^{dreams} occasions that we
 talked about, but didn't know if ever it would
 be possible. Then one day my husband insisted
 that I leave my young family in his care and
 take the "ancestral journey" with my father. He
 has a brother & sister in Verona, but spent his first
 twenty years in the Fifth Depot Lake-Organville
 area. He drove through this area & to the farm
 where he was born, & he related tales of his
 childhood. I am thankful that finally, we
 were able to take this trip together.

You mentioned that Simon Snider & family
 lived in the Saratoga area when the Revolution

broke out, which I did not know. This opens up a whole new area to explore. In our library there is a genealogy book which lists many Sniders in the Saratoga area in the early 1800's. Also, there is a book entitled "A Braggart in My Steps" by Dorothy Dumbrell. It is a history of Glengarry County. One chapter is entitled "Jacob Snider," 21. E. L. It gives a fair record of some of his descendants, & a few facts tie in with the Jacob Snider of Lancaster in the Reid incident. At any rate, this Jacob Snider was also from Saratoga, so again, there could be a connection. He is probably a brother of Simon's. I suppose Jacob was connected with Sir John Johnson's Corp, & Simon was with Jesups, & therefore they settled in different areas. Proving these suppositions is a constant challenge.

I am looking forward to meeting you & other members of the Branch in Adolphus town in September if my application is accepted in Toronto.

Thank you again, Dr Burlingh. Your letters have meant a great deal to me.

Family Is "Greatest Blessing" Says Nonagenarian On Birthday

When Mrs. William Ferguson was born Jennie Snider on her parents' farm in Portland Township, Canada was still a young nation just approaching its 20th birthday. For Harvey Snider and his wife Mary, young Jennie's birth added another link in a family circle which eventually numbered 10 children. "They raised big families in those days and I did too when I got married," said Mrs. Ferguson when The Beaver interviewed her last week.

On Sunday, March 6, Mrs. Ferguson celebrated her 90th birthday at the Slash Road home of her son and daughter in law, Mr. and Mrs. Everton W. Ferguson. It was a proud family occasion indeed with over one hundred people present during the afternoon reception held in her honor. Sixty-two of those who came to wish her well were her direct descendants. Some came from as far away as California, others from nearby or various parts of Ontario and New York State.

There were five generations present at the

party. They included Mrs. Ferguson's eight children, 24 grandchildren, 28 great grandchildren and two great great grandchildren. For a person who counts her children as the greatest blessing of her life it was a very happy occasion.

Mrs. Ferguson lived only six years of her life in Frontenac County, the remaining 84 years up to the present have been in Lennox and Addington County, with most of it spent in Denbigh Township where her parents farmed and where later, after her marriage to William Ferguson in 1903, she and her husband also farmed and raised their family. After they retired from farming, they moved to Morven, and lived there until her husband's death a few years ago.

Now Mrs. Ferguson lives with her son George at 481 William Street in Napanee. Although bothered by arthritis she still manages to share in household tasks and finds time every day to read her Bible. "I couldn't live without that," she said.

Keen and alert, though she doesn't get out and around as much as she used to, she appears to have taken in her stride the many changes and developments which have taken place in the world around her throughout the span of her lifetime. She does feel though that the lifestyle of her younger days gave greater satisfaction from work and just living than it does today. She feels that people cared more for each other and that there was "more friendship and charity then than now."

Mrs. Ferguson looked out the window of her home to where the traffic whizzed past along the Palace road and with nostalgia recalled the neighborliness of former days. "We have people living close now but you can't call them neighbors or friends," she said.

As she reminisced about days gone by she remembered the first motor car to appear in Napanee. "I was 17 that Spring," she said and someone said to me did you see that thing going down the street without horses?" Mrs. Ferguson lived and worked for a short time in Napanee but her greatest memories are of the days on the farm. Days were long and full of work, caring for her large garden in

summer months and doing all the farm chores in winter when the men were away logging. Even with helping with farm chores and raising her large family she still found time to help out family finances when for a few years she served as postmistress at Matawatchan "just over the line in Renfrew County."

Entertainment was simple, the annual church picnic, school concerts or "we would give the youngsters a taffy party when we tapped our maple trees in the Spring." Although they were members of the United Church, Mrs. Ferguson found she was too busy with her family and farm work to have time to be involved in organizations.

She is comfortable in her Napanee home but she misses the country and especially the animals which she loved. She and her son keep avid watch on the birds which come to the feeder on the front lawn but she still wishes there was an animal around the house.

Mrs. Ferguson received special greetings from many friends and relatives on her birthday as well as receiving good wishes from Premier William Davis and a special plaque from the Ontario Government. The Honorable James Taylor, MPP for Prince Edward-Lennox and Mrs. Taylor attended her birthday party and presented the plaque to her along with their personal good wishes. Mayor Lorne Smart also attended the at home to tender his personal greetings. Cards, letters and flowers came from many people and a special memento of the occasion is a birthstone ring set with 10 gems, the gift of her family.

Her only living sister, Mrs. Luella Sykes came from New York State to celebrate the day with her and she received a telephone call from her only remaining brother Alfred Snider in Florida where he is spending the winter. Mr. Snider lives at Cranberry Lake.

All of her sons and daughters were also on hand for the occasion. They are George, Arthur and Everton (Fergie) of Napanee, Nelson of Griffith and Ernest of Kingston, Mrs. F.J. Baker (Beatrice) of Toronto, Mrs. Christine Henderson of Morven, and Mrs. Wilson Leeson (Geneva) of Kingston.
