Hi Wesley:

I have completed 3 hours of work on your family. I can provide scans of pretty well anything that is listed here, if you desire. Here is what I have:

The book on the Loyalist families of Ernestown by Russ Waller does not show a Mary Lake who seems to fit the description. The only Ward in the book is Samuel Ward, born 1808, and his wife Mary Simmons and their family.

Searching petitions from all Mary's from Ernestown did not bring up anything that stood out as a likely candidate. I can look up and scan any petitions that you consider interesting.

I found no Mary Lake in the marriage bonds of Upper Canada. Bonds from the correct area were: Alexander Lake and Mary Blackaby, both of Loughborough, 1832 Kingston Christopher Lake and Christianna Napp, both of Loughborough, 1832 Kingston Davis Harley (an error for Hawley) of Fredericksburgh and Amelia Lake, 1832, Napanee

There was nothing in "More Notices from Methodist Papers, 1830-1857"

From "Obituaries from Canada's Christian Guardian":

James Lake, father of Rev. J.N. Lake, Wesleyan minister, London, died Oct. 19, 1867 at his residence in Morven (Ernestown), aged 75.

Nicholas Lake was born at Little Husic, Bennington Co., N.Y. in 1781 and came to Canada as a child with his father, a U.E.L., settling on the Rideau. He died in Mariposa, June 12, 1863, aged 82; survived by a daughter.

From "More Notices from Ontario's Methodist Papers, 1858-1872": Aaron Lake Sr., who joined the P.M. church in Storrington with several members of his family 11 years ago, died in Storrington, 4th inst., aged 76; survived by his children and grandchildren.

Mrs. Elizabeth Lake, born in the U.S. in Dec., 1877, died in Storrington in Feb., 1872, after a fall on her cellar stairs; survived by 11 sons and daughters, 4 of whom are local preachers.

From "Obituaries from Ontario's Christian Guardian, 1873-1880:

Mrs. Margaret Lake, daughter of Samuel and Jane McChesney Bell, was born at Clifton Park, near Albany, N.Y., July 4, 1778 and raised Protestant. In the spring of 1812, because of the prospect of war between Britain and the U.S., the family moved to Canada, and settled in Ernestown Twp., near the village of Bath. On Jan. 26, 1822, she married James Lake, and joined the Methodist Church. In Jan., 1853, her 4 sons and 3 daughters-in-law were converted. She died Jan. 25, 1876 at the residence of her son Silas F. Lake, Ernestown; predeceased by her husband 8 years earlier.

From "More Obituaries from Ontario's Methodist Papers":

John Lake was converted when a boy upwards of 50 years ago under the ministry of the Reformed Methodists in Storrington....Three years ago, he moved from Storrington to a rented farm near Elginburg. Because of liver complaint, he retired 2 years later to the village, where he died Jan. 2, 1883; survived by his wife and children.

From "Ernestown" by Larry Turner: "In the same month, or thereabout, Rev. Losee undertook to build a second church. The site was in second township or Ernestown, and on the front, not far east of the village of Bath. The principal persons who aided in building this meeting house were James Parrot, John Lake, Robert Clarke, Jacob Miller and others. According to a document dated March 26, 1802, Joseph Jewell, presiding elder of the Methodist Societies in Upper Canada, appointed James Parrot, Robert Clark, Jacob Miller, John Lake, George Miller, James Lake and Matthew Clark to be trustees to the Methodist meeting house now standing on lot 27, first concession in Ernestown.

"Families like the Fairfield's and Clark's may have prospered along the front, but others, like the Parrott's, Lake's, Shibley's and Aylesworth families moved to rear concessions."

"James P. Lake moved his carriage-making business to Napanee to be closer to the GTR station there."

From "Men of Upper Canada, militia rolls, 1828-1829"

In the Addington militia were Daniel Lake (aged 22), another Daniel Lake, (aged 24), James Lake Jr. (aged 33), Nicholas Lake (aged 28), and William Lake (aged 23), Christopher Ward, James Ward and William Ward. (no ages given for the Wards)

I have the estate documents of John Lake Sr. He doesn't mention a daughter Mary.

The John Collins Clark diary has several mentions of the Lake family, but nothing for Mary. It says that John Lake Sr. of Adolphustown, died Oct. 21, 1857. William Lake died May 22, 1859. William Ward died July 28, 1860, aged 88. Mrs. William Ward died Oct. 2, 1842. There is no mention of Robert Harrison in it.

I have a locations register or assessment roll from 1820 Ernestown. It shows that James Lake is leasing all of lot 13, concession 4 from the government. John Lake is located on the west half of lot 15, concession 4. A James Lake is located on the east half of lot 19, conc. 4. A John Leak (i.e., Lake) is located on the west half of lot 20, conc. 4. A John Lake is on the west half of lot 24, conc. 4. Samuel Ward was on lot 25, conc. 7. William Ward was on lot 28, conc. 7.

I also looked at the family names in the index to the Kingston newspaper: I have underlined the one I thought might be relevant. I have a scan of that notice.

My suggestions for further research include:

the Burleigh papers at Queen's University Archives, the Anglican Archives, for the early Anglican registers (I consider this one a must--if you don't wish to continue, but have not done this, then please arrange to get these registers searched--they are indexed at the Archives, which are in Kingston), the Township papers at the Archives of Ontario, for the lots we have identified as Lake property and possibly Ward property, the early deeds for any identified lots, together with memorials of transactions which may mention a wife's name.

Oh yes, I don't know if you are interested or not, and if not, that's fine, but I thought you might like to know that I have a really good used copy of Larry Turner's Ernestown for sale. I'm asking \$25.00 plus postage for it.
